Hugo was the final destination of a wave of immigrants who had left France in the 17th Century to settle along the banks of the St. Lawrence River, and whose descendants found their way to Hugo in the 19th Century. Our modern-day family has left Hugo for educational and occupational opportunities throughout the country. But when we looked over the plat maps of Oneka Township and Centerville, visited former residences in Hugo and the farm of C.V. Cummings, my great-grandfather, we began to see that Oneka Township/Hugo was in effect a recreation of the close-knit farming communities that our great-grandparents had left behind in the St. Lawrence River Valley.
